I want to welcome you to our first Newsflash for 2018 and remind everyone that your cottage association continues to work year-round looking out for your Kawagama and Bear Lake interests and concerns.

Our ongoing lake activities include; setting and maintaining a navigation system, monitoring and liaising with MNRF about lake levels, sampling lake water to measure nutrient concentrations (total phosphorus, TP, and calcium, Ca) <u>Lake Partner Program</u>, working with MNRF to maintain health fish populations, and monitoring lake development and variance requests.

On the social side of things, our annual AGM will be at the Dorset Rec Center on Saturday, July 7th from 10 am until noon. We'll keep the business portion of the meeting to half hour so that we may focus on our guest speaker's topic; "How climate change is affecting our lake".

**Ice Fishing with Kids** — Ice fishing is one of the fun pastimes of winter cottaging that I enjoy and am trying to share with my eight-year-old daughter. Despite the cold temperatures, it can be a great activity to do with friends or kids. As any parent knows, starting a new activity with kids can be challenging as they can become impatient, bored, frustrated.

Here are some tips on how to make ice fishing fun with kids:

- Start with short trips out onto the ice. It may take you an hour to set up, and an hour to take down the activity and you may only get an hour of 'fishing' time with the kids. It may be best to start ice fishing somewhere close to the cottage so it is easy to retreat to the safety of the indoors when needed.
- Keep it fun. If they are not having fun, neither will you and it will not leave them with a good memory or desire to come back again. For little kids, remember to bring shovels so they can dig in the snow while waiting for the fish to bite. Teach them about the fish. Encourage them to explore around the fishing site. Sometimes we build a fire on the ice to roast hot dogs or marshmallows, which is great fun for kids.
- Prepare ahead of time. Get gear ready and pre-tie lines at home.
- Keep warm and dry. Don't go out if the temperatures are too extreme as the added wind on the lake will make it seem even colder. Dress properly to start and bring a change of socks/clothes. Inevitably someone will step into a hole and get their feet wet so be prepared.
- Drill holes 10 to 15 feet apart (one line per hole). This way everyone is close by but their lines will not get tangled.
- BRING FOOD! It will keep them warm and entertained.

In addition to these tips, remember to follow these ice fishing rules:

- Have a valid fishing licence (e.g., sport or conservation).
- Follow the rules when using fishing lines.
- Only one line may be used when angling through the ice.
- Lake Trout can't keep any between 40-55 cm (15.7-21.7 in.).
- You can't bring any device that uses a mechanical spring to set the fishing hook (other than a fishing rod under tension).

## All About Ice —

#### Ice can be Uneven

- Remember, ice doesn't freeze at a uniform thickness.
- Near-shore ice is often much thicker and safer than ice farther out, especially at the start of the winter season.
- Check thickness regularly with a spud bar or auger as you move farther out.
- Ice that formed over flowing water, springs, pressure cracks, old ice holes or around the mouths of rivers and streams can be weaker than surrounding ice.

### **Ice has Different Colours**

- Clear blue ice is the strongest.
- White or opaque ice is much weaker.
- Stay away from ice that looks honeycombed, common during thaws or in the spring.

### **Driving on Ice**

- Be careful when driving snowmobiles or vehicles over frozen lakes or rivers.
- Snowmobiles need at least 20 centimetres (8 inches) of clear blue ice.
- Light vehicles need 30 centimetres (12 inches) or more.
- Double the thickness if the ice is white or opaque.
- Heavy snow on a frozen lake or river slows down the freezing process.

### Before you venture out

- Check ice conditions with local ice hut operators or other anglers.
- Let others know where you're planning to fish and when you plan to return.
- Wear appropriate clothing and equipment for safety and comfort.



**Broad-Scale Bulletin** — In 2008 the Ministry of Natural Resources implemented the Ecological Framework for Fisheries Management. The primary objectives of this framework are to improve the sustainability of fisheries, to involve the public in fisheries management, and provide better service with simpler fishing regulations.

To support these goals the ministry created a broad-scale monitoring program. This monitoring program evaluates Ontario fisheries on a broad scale, by collecting samples from a representative number of lakes in a standardized way. The samples collected include information about fish species, water characteristics, and invasive species. These samples are gathered over a 5-year period. As part of the second cycle of broad-scale monitoring between 2013 and 2017, Kawagama Lake was selected as part of the sample group for zone 15. The following is the summary bulletin for Kawagama.

Fish netting results

Fish populations were surveyed using large and small mesh nets to provide information on fish species present and their characteristics, such as growth, age, and abundance. The catch data (depicted in the chart below) show that 9 species were surveyed in large mesh nets. Additional fish species observed in small mesh nets were Bluntnose Minnow and Rainbow Smelt.



#### About Broad-scale Fisheries Monitoring

The Broad-scale Fisheries Monitoring program collects information from representative lakes in fisheries management zones across the province to help biologists manage our fisheries effectively. This bulletin provides a snapshot of recent monitoring activities and netting results. The sampling approach allows us to measure and evaluate the health of Ontario's lakes and their fish communities, and track changes through time over broad areas of Ontario. 



Further analysis conducted by the ministry during this study suggested that a large population of the Lake Trout found in Kawagama are considered to be "small-bodied" based on the species potential growth. The study suggests that this is due to the feed availability in the lake. The majority of the fish in the lake are found to have a fork length of 350-500 mm. This converts to roughly a total length of 400-550 mm, which aligns perfectly with the slot-length limit set out by the ministry for Kawagama lake. Now that the ministry is aware of this information there is an opportunity to adjust fishing regulations to make them more suitable for the fish population in our lake.






Catch results are presented in 10-cm length intervals, labelled with the lower limit (e.g., the "20 cm" interval represents fish between 20 cm and 29 cm). The size of Lake Trout ranged from 19 to 54 cm and the size of Smallmouth Bass ranged from 16 to 47 cm in large mesh nets.

#### Water chemistry and temperature

Water samples were collected in May 2014 and sent to the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change for analysis. Water temperature, oxygen levels, and water transparency were measured in August 2015. The graph shows the temperature of Kawagama Lake with increasing depth. The temperature at the surface was 20.7 degrees Celsius and declined to 4.5 degrees Celsius at the bottom of the lake.
